'Housewives' Won't Come Clean

t was a moment made for reality TV:

At a party Wednesday to honor D.C.'s best dressed, Washingtonian Publisher Cathy Merrill Williams was handing out the awards. But when she called for honoree Lynda Erkiletian ("for showing that Washington 'housewives' have style!") - no one stepped forward. Erkiletian was missing!

Oh, come on: This had to be for the sake of the very conspicuous TV cameras, which Williams had already announced were at the Liaison Capitol Hill Hotel party to capture footage for Bravo's in-development "Real Housewives of Washington."

But no, that's not the case, we're told. Erkiletian, owner of T.H.E. Artist Agency, had ducked out to change. She had dressed in a heavy cape and stockings for what was supposed to be a rooftop affair, but then the party moved indoors to a warm and crowded room. (The TV producers, in fact, asked the magazine to hold off on the announcement until she returned, but Williams kept to her own schedule.)

Another question: What's up with D.C.'s worst-kept secret, the identities of the "Housewives"-to-be? 


Lynda Erkiletian, left, Rich Amons and Brooke Kao at the Washingtonian party.

Why won't Bravo confirm what seems so obvious? Probably because nothing's a done deal. It's not unusual for reality producers to spend hours trailing a subject before deciding they just don't work. Meanwhile, said Bravo rep Rachelle Savoia, "we're looking for women who have their hands on the pulse of what's going on culturally and politically, who encapsulate what it means to be D.C. society."
